From the Rector's Desk

As I write this, it is December 27--Day 3 of the Christmas liturgical season, which extends to January 6th, the Day of Epiphany, when we celebrate the arrival of the Magi at Jesus' manger. As I am a big believer in celebrating the Twelve Days of Christmas, I am thoroughly enjoying this special time.

Even so, I am keenly aware that while the Church's new year began about a month ago on the first Sunday of Advent, January 1 marks our culture's New Year right in the midst of the Christmas season, so like many others I am pondering New Year's resolutions. One resolution that I am determined to keep is to get more exercise in 2019. I know that good health is holistic: physical well-being supports mental and spiritual health. Thus in exercising more I will not only be strengthening my body but also taking care of my mind and soul.

Another resolution I have in mind is not just for me but for the whole parish. It's actually something that the Vestry discussed at their December meeting. The resolution is for all of us at St. Thomas to be more intentional in how we extend hospitality to visitors on Sunday mornings.

Don't get me wrong: St. Thomas parishioners are a wonderful, welcoming group of people. Visitors frequently comment on how friendly and helpful our ushers/greeters are. And I have always been impressed by the efforts you as a congregation make to exchange the Peace with visitors. But when it comes to coffee hour, visitors can slip through the cracks. Although we certainly invite them to come to coffee hour after our Sunday services, we pretty much leave them on their own to make their way there. Unfortunately, visitors can feel a bit shy or awkward about walking alone from the church to the

parish hall. They can feel intimidated, too, when they get to the parish hall and see parishioners seated at tables, obviously enjoying one another but seemingly oblivious to the strangers in their midst.

As someone who has battled shyness all her life, I know how hard it is to break into a seemingly closed social group. During the years before I became a priest, I visited churches where no one spoke to me at coffee hour, or invited me to sit with them at their table. Not surprisingly, I did not continue to attend those churches!

I am hoping therefore that when you see people you don't know in worship, you will make a point of inviting them to come *with* you to coffee hour so that they don't have to go alone. And if you see a stranger in the parish hall, go over to that person (even if it means getting up from your table!), introduce yourself, and invite him or her to sit with you.

Coffee hour is often jokingly referred to as the eighth sacrament of the Episcopal Church! But it is no joke to say that coffee hour is an extension of what we do in church as the Body of Christ. In worship, we break bread together with the wafer and the wine, with Christ as our Host. In coffee hour, we break bread together with our coffee and cookies, extending Christ's hospitality to one another. Let us make sure that just as Christ intentionally includes all of us at His holy table, we intentionally include everyone during our time of fellowship after worship.

- **REST** Receive the gift of God's grace, peace, and restoration

This worthy GrassRoots fundraiser allows you to select and sponsor a 40-foot vegetable bed from over 100 producing beds while honoring a friend, relative or associate with a gift that grows throughout the 2019 gardening year. You may want to visit the Garden and choose a bed from sections with names such as Ladybird Beetle, Dragonfly, or Damselfly or other beneficial insects. Apple, Pear, Asian Pear, Cherry and Plum trees also make a great gift, heralding the seasons with blossoms in the Spring and lovely fruit in the Fall. Choose a specific tree from over 100 trees in the orchards and if you wish, create your own garden tag or marker to give with your gift.

Each bed, tree, or compost bin can be sponsored for a one-year fee of \$50 that includes name placement on our Donor Recognition Wall and a card acknowledging your gift.
