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From the Rector's Desk

It's a beautiful fall day as I write this. I love this time of year with its cool nights, sunny, warm days, and the leaves just beginning to turn. Although we're three quarters into the year, autumn always feels like a season of new beginnings. As I look out my office window, I see the Head Start children running around the playground shrieking in glee. I see the green houses of the Grassroots Garden, which is packed with volunteers busily harvesting the latest crops of tomatoes, squashes, even corn. I can even catch a glimpse of the Center for Community Counseling, where a new group of interns has just joined the professional volunteer staff in providing much-needed mental health services to clients. And of course we've begun a new program year, with the choir returning, seasonal changes in the Eucharistic Prayer and service music, and planning underway for Advent programming and even Christmas services. And of course, fall is the season when we hold our Annual Giving Stewardship campaign so that we can put together the 2023 budget.

Last year our Stewardship theme was St. Thomas: Worshiping, Feeding, Nurturing, Healing. The Stewardship Committee and I stressed how St. Thomas as a faith community is a place of worship, along with the Grassroots Garden feeding our neighbors, Head Start nurturing young children and their families, and the Center for Community Counseling providing healing to so many in distress. All these things are still true.

Upon further reflection, however, I believe that all these aspects—worshiping, feeding, nurturing, and healing—are integral to the parish of St. Thomas and always have been, long before a preschool, the Garden, and the CCC were established on our campus. Our very worship feeds, nurtures, and heals us. We are spiritually fed, nurtured, and healed by the bread and wine, the music, the prayers, the homilies, the exchange of the Peace, and the sheer fellowship of coming together as the Body of Christ.

In addition, outside our Sunday services we worship, feed, nurture, and heal as well. Through our Outreach program and our contributions to the St. John's food pantry we feed others, along with helping others with shelter and clothing. Our Men's Bible Study and other programs for adults and children

nurture parishioners' spiritual development. Our Prayer Team is a healing ministry, as is our Creation Care ministry. And because ours is an incarnational faith, we believe anything we do to serve others and all of creation is an act of love for God, and therefore is an act of worship.

So this year the Stewardship Team, led by Senior Warden Len Calvert, has decided to retain last year's Stewardship theme. Later in October, you will hear from parishioners about giving to St. Thomas and you will receive your 2023 estimated giving certificates. Our goal as always is to have those certificates returned by November 6th, All Saints' Sunday, so that we can bless them at the altar and begin our budget planning.

During October, then, I hope you will take some time prayerfully to reflect on the role St. Thomas plays in your life in worshiping, feeding, nurturing, and healing, and will then find it in your hearts to give generously in 2023 so that St. Thomas can continue doing all it does out of love for God in Christ.

Outreach

The Outreach committee has been in contact with the rectors at St. John the Divine and Resurrection churches regarding the shelter programs they sponsor.



Rev. Ann proposed that the Outreach Committee address the needs of these programs that provide shelter services to the unhoused in the community. The Outreach committee voted to provide a one-time donation of \$500 to each church in support of their shelter projects.

Looking ahead to Thanksgiving, \$500 from the Outreach account will be contributed to One Hope Thanksgiving boxes. A team will be organized to assist with packing boxes. Outreach funds will be

used to provide Christmas gift bags, including sweat suits and small toys, for the children attending Head Start at St. Thomas. Parishioners will be enlisted to assist with shopping for these items with an approximate expenditure of \$1600 - \$2000. In addition, Outreach funds will be contributed to United Way of Lane County for Cedar Creek Fire disaster relief in the amount of \$500; and, to Episcopal Relief and Development for Ukraine disaster relief in the amount of \$500.

It is gratifying to know that as a parish we are able to provide this substantial *outreach* due to the allocation to Outreach in our 2022 budget as well as additional contributions from parishioners.

Center for Community Counseling

Wine is on our minds as we plan for the April 13th Major Donor Wine Tasting launching our "Legacy **Society."** We have developed our giving levels (Empower, Uplift, Encourage, Support, Engageranging from \$300 - \$5000 annually) which will give donors various levels to pick from for a threeyear pledge commitment. We have identified our major donors and are seeking to recruit a person(s) from amongst that group to become Chairperson or Co-Chairperson. We have secured Civic Winery and will be asking them to donate a percentage of wine sales to CCC during the event. A raffle is being planned and sponsors will be approached to underwrite the costs. Save the date cards will be sent around November 1st with invitations sent February 1st. The design of all printed materials has also begun. This is a great opportunity for us to secure funding, increase donor giving and steward our donors for support throughout the year including the fall Fashion Show.

Our new cohort of interns has joined us and finished orientation and training. The new interns are excited to get going with their new caseload. We are taking care to match clients and interns in a manner that allows them both to be successful. We are currently full. It has been a relief to have the resources to offer eight new intakes in September.

We are waiting for grant decisions from several funders; some will make decisions in October and some in November. We submitted two grant

applications this month and have three due in October.

We hired a new 8-10 hours per week Administrative Assistant, Romelle Renner. Her primary duties will be to manage Quickbooks and Giftworks as well as support newsletters, mailings, events, etc.

GrassRoots Garden

In Memory of Lynn Negus September 4, 1939 to September 3, 2022

Celebrating Lynn Negus and appreciating all she has given to GrassRoots Garden, to the people of the Garden, to the greater community and to the planet.



Since 2001, Lynn helped to transform GrassRoots Garden into the thriving community it is today by creating resource support, developing demonstration gardens, strengthening our ties to the Master Gardener program, and recruiting and recognizing volunteers and donors. Lynn created and coordinated the Adopt a Plot program, an annual membership drive that annually raised up to \$6,000 for the Garden and connected 100 community members to our work. She took countless photos of garden activities and participants and created a DVD that she used for promotional purposes as well as a thank you gift for donors. She was a team leader for groups of disadvantaged youth who volunteered at GrassRoots as part of the Looking Glass Program. She further supported the youth by

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documenting their efforts with photos which she presented to each upon their completion. She shared her knowledge of working with challenged youth with the garden coordinator, increasing her skills and knowledge base.

In 2015, Lynn orchestrated the creation of the Adaptive and Educational Garden Area, a demonstration of adaptive and container gardening with detailed educational displays. She also had the Adaptive Garden designated as certified pollinator habitat. The Adaptive Garden wraps around St. Thomas Episcopal Church, and is a beautiful thank you to the church congregation for their support of GrassRoots Garden. Lynn encouraged many skilled professionals to volunteer their skills to the Garden; she was also active on the Master Gardener GrassRoots Garden Committee; and she created the financial and in-kind donor walls at the Garden.

Lynn was a remarkable garden volunteer for many reasons, including: her willingness to share her knowledge and skills in working with people of all ages, backgrounds and abilities; her ability to see a need of the program, and to devote herself to finding the resources, people and time to meet that need, with very little direction; and her clear, logistical thinking which she used to problem solve seemingly insurmountable challenges. Lynn increased the capacity of Grassroots Garden by connecting and strengthening ties with collaborating partners, donors, and professional volunteers; and by being a strong advocate for the program throughout the community.

Lynn was an incredible force at GrassRoots Garden, inspiring so many in our community by the beauty she created, her passion and commitment to the mission and vision of the Garden and FOOD for Lane County, and her compassion to everyone who sought out Grassroots to find community and a place to contribute. No other participant at GrassRoots did more to build community, develop programs, teach compassion and inclusion, and nurture, support and champion those who were the underdogs of the Garden and the community.

Lynn set a high bar for others to aspire to. Her impact has had deep and profound ripples in the

lives of all who were fortunate enough to have been with her and touched by her.

Reflections



The following is a *reflection* from Deacon Mike Watkins.

Awe and Wonder

Bishop Michael Curry was in the diocese this month. The clergy from the diocese were invited to gather, either in-person or on-line, to hear him speak. The message he presented echoed much of his long-standing theme: Love for others will sustain and build the body of Christ.

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In addition, he recognized the state of our political and social turmoil. He was adamant that we in the country had experienced these periods before and we had endured and became even stronger.

The meeting broke up, people were outside and I turned and the Presiding Bishop was standing there with his entourage. A memory flash and a moment in time came flooding back.

Several years ago my wife and I were at the annual convention of the Diocese of Oklahoma. In the hotel, we got on an elevator and standing there was Michael Curry. Both of us stood in awe. I think my mouth hung open. We probably managed a weak "Good Morning."

Soon after this flash into history I related the event to a retired bishop. And, he told me about meeting Prince Philip while attending a Lambeth Council. The Bishop's reenactment of his own wide-open eyes and gaping mouth caused us both to laugh.

For me, the question now arises, "Would I stand open-mouthed if I met Jesus on the street?" Would I greet Him as an old friend and speak to Him of my personal secrets? I hope you have asked yourselves a similar question before.

The question is relevant because there are instances when I've known people who have some amount of power or at least some minor name recognition. After a time, the awe and wonder is not really there anymore. The "other" has become just "another." It's not that my respect, my friendship, or my acknowledgment has waned. But the other person had become like me.

I don't want that to happen in my knowing Jesus the Christ. Yes, I want to speak freely, I want to listen intently to Him. But I don't want to lose that sense of wonder and awe. And yet, I want to power-through those mouth-gaping moments, find my inner voice and be with a true friend.

My reflection on this question will continue. My thoughts will wander but will return to my original question; and Jesus will still be on my mind.
