#### Parish Annual Meeting



The Annual Meeting of St. Thomas Episcopal Church, Eugene, scheduled for Sunday, January 28, is an opportunity to review the parish activity of 2023 and consider the budget proposed for parish operations in 2024. The meeting will be held inperson in the Parish Hall immediately following the 10:00 am service during the 11:30 am coffee hour.

This meeting is important not just for the review of parish business and the proposed budget, but as an opportunity to gather together and celebrate the spiritual life and ministries of our parish. Outgoing Vestry members will be acknowledged and a new Vestry and delegates to Diocesan Convention will be elected.

#### **Endowment Fund News**

#### 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter Results Almost Flat

I know it looks odd to be reporting September Endowment Fund financial news in January. But 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter (July – September) Oregon Community



Foundation results came in after the deadline for the December *Beacon*. And I want to keep you all informed of The Fund's finances. So take a look back to September 30...

As of September 30 your Endowment Fund's total assets were \$241,072.81. This represented a loss of (\$1,179.97), or (.49%) for the quarter.

For 2023 to date the increase was \$15,994.32, or 7.1%. For the 12-month period ending September 30 the increase was \$32,229.14, or 15.43%.

While some financial statistics look good, the fact is that rampant inflation and resulting price increases in energy and food have kept their feet on the brakes of key segments of the economy. So while I'd have preferred more growth, I'm OK with ours.

Please join me in hoping for a better fourth quarter.

After the hustle of harvest season, we at GrassRoots have our annual opportunity to take a deep breath, reflect on the last growing season, and shift our focus to perennial crop pruning and crop planning for the coming season. While in some ways it is now the "slow" time of year, there is plenty of work to be getting on with to set ourselves up well for next season and for future projects.



As part of our winter reflection and pruning work, we are excited to announce a couple of upcoming events this month: mark your calendars!

On Tuesday, January 9th at 7pm at St Thomas Episcopal Church in Eugene, GrassRoot's Emily Johnson will be giving a presentation about her recent experience in Japan as a part of a leadership course she took this autumn: Climate Change and Food System- Youth Leading the Way, through iLEAP in partnership with Western Washington University. The course involved a series of online trainings followed by an in-person week at the Asian Rural Institute in Japan, a 50+ year old regenerative farm specializing in training people from around the world in leadership skills and regenerative agricultural techniques. Emily will share the highlights of what she learned in an interactive presentation, and we will discuss how we all can put these ideas into practice in our own community.

On Saturday, January 27<sup>th</sup> from 10am-noon, Dick Mombell will be leading a blueberry pruning workshop at the GrassRoots Garden blueberry patch. Dick worked for many years in the blueberry industry and has a great deal of knowledge about the crop to share. This is an excellent opportunity to gain a better understanding of how to prune and reinvigorate blueberry plants to keep them healthy, thriving and productive. We hope to see you there!

### Introducing Scott Lubbock and All Ears

With the current absence of a Sunday School our classrooms are vacant; only the nursery room is in regular use. With that difficult reality in mind, the Vestry considered a proposal from Scott Lubbock of All Ears, LLC, to pay a \$350 per month use fee for occupancy of the middle classroom. The Vestry did their due diligence as they assessed this opportunity to assist with our facility maintenance costs. It was necessary for Scott to vacate his current office downtown as his building was sold, so he came to St. Thomas for consideration to move his office onto our campus.

Scott established All Ears more than two decades ago. It is a "listening service" for clients that operates on a sliding scale basis according to their ability to pay. Scott is not a licensed therapist and does mostly individual counseling. He has considerable experience working with people struggling with substance abuse, particularly alcohol; thus his services complement rather than conflict with those of the CCC. He does not advertise, and his clients either hear of him by word of mouth or are referred by their physicians. The terms of the agreement are for a period of one year. To emphasize that All Ears is part of the mission of the church and our Outreach program, Scott has offered a free drop-in clinic to parishioners once a week.

Before agreeing to the arrangement, the Vestry made sure a background check was conducted. By the nature of his business, Scott is a mandatory reporter. In addition, since his office would be on a campus with children, Scott also completed the online Safe Church training, and his certificate of completion is in his file with the lease agreement. As requested by the terms of the agreement, Scott has named St. Thomas on his certificate of insurance, and his key fits only the door to his new office.

The Vestry believes that the nature of Scott's work fits beautifully with the mission of the church. You will enjoy meeting and getting to know him.


## Lenten Book Study on Celtic Christianity

During Lent, Rev. Ann will be offering a book study on Celtic Christianity. The book is *Listening for the Heartbeat of God* by John Philip Newell, a scholar, pilgrimage leader, and teacher of Celtic spirituality.


Celtic Christianity emphasizes the essential goodness of creation and of humanity made in the image of God. The book traces the lines of Celtic spirituality from the British church in the fourth century through to the twentieth century.

John Philip finds Celtic spiritual roots in the New Testament, in the mysticism of St. John the Evangelist. John was especially remembered as the one who lay against Jesus at the Last Supper and heard the heartbeat of God. Hence he became a Celtic image of listening to God in all of life.

The book study will meet during coffee hour on three Sundays: February 18, March 3, and March 17. A sign-up sheet will be available in the weeks before.
