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From the Rector's desk ~

I love Advent.

Advent: The season of light, waiting, anticipation, hope, and preparation for our Lord's birth. The word "Advent" comes from the Latin *adventus*, which means "coming" or "arrival." Advent prepares us for, and leads us to, Jesus' birth in Bethlehem.

When we observe Advent, the season gives us a respite from December's normal whirlwind of secular Christmas parties, shopping, decorating, cleaning, and cooking. All those activities contribute to the joy of Christmas celebrations, and there's absolutely nothing wrong with them. And as most of you know, I LOVE Christmas (my father used to call me the "Christmas Kid" when I was growing up). But the busyness of Christmas preparations sometimes makes it difficult for us to hang onto the quiet centeredness and watchful waiting that are so much a part of the Advent season.

So, as we await the birth of Jesus, I hope you will give yourselves some breathing room to experience Advent—to experience the promise that with the birth of our Savior the old is passing away and all things are being made new.

Perhaps, you might spend a few minutes each morning in prayer or meditation, devotional reading and breathing. In the evening, light the candle on your Advent wreath and say a prayer. At noon each day, perhaps walk out to your front porch, breathe deeply for a couple of minutes, repeating "Come, Lord Jesus."

Here is a favorite Advent prayer of mine: "God of grace, your eternal Word took flesh among us when Mary placed her life at the service of your will. Prepare our hearts for his coming again; keep us steadfast in hope and faithful in service, that we may receive the coming of his kingdom for the sake of Jesus Christ, the ruler of all, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. James the Less

What we know about James the Less, or James the Little, can be written in a very short space. The Bible tells us practically nothing about this disciple.

Maybe you are curious about his name. This James had "the Little" or "the Less" tacked onto his name to distinguish him from the other James (James the Elder or Greater) who was taller and bigger. James the Greater was John's brother and the son of Zebedee. Little James, we think, may have been the son of Alphaeus. That would have made Matthew and James brothers. Both were tax collectors.

Of one thing we can be sure: James the Less's mother was Mary of Clopas, who was one of the women who was devoted to Jesus. She stood at the foot of the cross at Jesus' crucifixion and visited the sepulcher early Easter morning. She may also have been the sister of Mary, the mother of Jesus. A carpenter's saw is the symbol of James the Less in Christian art. It is believed that his body was sawed to pieces.

Outreach

This year there was an added bonus to enhance the experience. Each bed, tree, or compost bin can be sponsored for a one-year fee of \$50. The kiwi arbor, berry patches, greenhouses and other structures and gardens are also available for adoption in 2025 from \$250 to \$1000 each. Reflections



We are in a contentious time in our country, and as people of faith the discord can be disheartening. But it is not a unique experience for throughout our nation's history as well as world history, there have been periods of considerable conflict and strife. And the issues are never fully resolved. They can hibernate or segue into other forms of contention. The more pragmatic among us might say that is just human nature, but I prefer to trust in the goodness of the human spirit and the determination to overcome dark times. During his time of year when we experience Advent, the promise of the Messiah, we look for the light that overcomes the darkness. In the best of circumstances, the light shines through no matter the time of year.

After decades of being involved in holiday ice shows as a skater and later as a coach and skating director, I happily recall the delight skaters, crew and audiences experienced with these productions. Skating as a sport and physical discipline can be a mean business. But I had a message shared with all my skating students, a message learned from my mother, and that was and still is to conduct oneself with grace and dignity on and off the ice. It was not easy, especially when skaters were preparing for competitions and the ice was crowded with other skaters doing the same. My coaching style was to encourage all skill levels, to share the ice, to celebrate the successes of other skaters. That is the way to be a bright light on and off the ice.

So at this time of year, I fondly recall those annual holiday ice shows that truly were the best of times on the ice. It was exhilarating and joyful. Skaters of all levels came together to present an entertaining show that captivated the audience with the beauty and joy of skating under the lights. And the skaters, too, were energized to face the year ahead as the training became more grueling, the testing more demanding and the competition stiffer. Those annual ice shows were a bright light for me and for my skaters.

Perhaps this is a simplistic analogy for managing life's greatest challenges, but it is a message that has always served to recalibrate my spirit. It is more than just sharing the ice. The effort to come together despite our differences can overcome challenges and create something truly wonderful. It is effort that is energized by the light within each of us. *Share the grace you have received and be the light you wish to see.*
