The Super Sifter Story

Whack, whack, whack!

One might ask, what is the origin of such a strange sound coming from various sites in the Garden the last three weeks?

Well, to make a long story short: the contraption in the photo is the result of design and construction by Gary Jordan and has been given the title: "Cave Tech Compost Super Sifter."

Its function is simple but effective requiring three persons the basic operation looks like this: a large wheelbarrow is placed in the cavity of the beast; several scoops of seasoned compost are dumped in the box with a 1/4-inch screen for a bottom and wheels under the box. So, here is the human participation: the driver moves the box back-andforth whacking the box against the striker-plate at both ends. This creates a vibration that begins to separate the various particles that will penetrate the 1/4-inch screen or not.

This function is assisted by the hands of the two persons on either side, rubbing their hands backand-forth and pressing down to complete the separation process. This takes about a few seconds; the screen is quickly cleaned and ready for another cycle. The wheelbarrow rapidly fills with the smooth powdery gourmet treat just the way soil microbes like it. That is about as brief as I can make it. So, anyone who would like to experience this process for the making of food for the gods of soil, we welcome your participation. Happy Shifting!



Gary Jordan is a longtime GrassRoots Garden participant who came to the Garden in 2014 as a Master Gardener, Compost Specialist. Since then, he has taught composting both at the free City/Master Gardener compost demonstrations, in small groups and one on one to other GrassRoots participants, he's helped maintain the compost site turning piles and sifting the finished outcome. For many years, he's been repairing and rebuilding our large fleet of wheelbarrows and has become our head fix-it person and builder of many picnic tables and benches, planting boxes, two person sifters and the designer, builder and chief operator of the remarkable and extremely effective Super Sifter. For all he gives to the Garden, we can't thank him enough!

Wildflowers are truly a marvel! These delicate blooms in all their various shapes and colors are the epitome of resilience – nature's way of showing us mere mortals of how to prevail. Despite tempests, draught, wildfire, erosion, overgrazing, and exposure to toxins they return. Sometimes the return is slow and steady, and sometimes in great profusion, but with their innate resilience the wildflowers return. Wildflowers even survive the ravages of war. As Britain recovered from the blitz of World War II, climbing through the bombed out ruins was the Wandering Willy, a graceful viney plant with blooms in various colors.

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In the Willamette Valley it is a nature observer's delight to watch the colorful progression. Wild iris brighten the forest floor with purple accents; Camus cover the fields in blue profusion; spring beauty sprinkle the hay fields with their pink blossoms; and wild roses grace the highway shoulders in vivid hues of pink. Take a deeper dive into the woods and the determined hiker will see fairy slipper orchids, trillium, grass pinks and Soloman Seal. And as summer progresses fire weed, blue lupin, and oxeye daisies will grace the hillsides. What a vibrant gift provided by the creator and a reminder that with resilience we too can prevail.
