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Senior Warden's Message

We are a faith community in transition. As Senior Warden I hear your concerns and feel your anxiety, but I also see your devotion to this parish in all the gracious actions, generous giving, caring concerns, and joyful spirit generated throughout our congregation. No doubt there are questions as to how we will move forward. I want to assure you that your Vestry, supported by the many designated committees that assist with the management of our campus, our wonderful parish administrator, JB, our devoted Deacon Mike, and our ever-reliable priest associate Frank are all engaged in leading our parish forward. We have been blessed with Rev. Ann as our rector for the past eight years, and she has been thoughtful in guiding our way forward.

With Ann's guidance, the Vestry has read <u>Part Time is Plenty</u> by G. Jeffrey MacDonald. This is an engaging read that shares examples of parishes that have navigated a positive way forward with part time clergy. The practical reality for St. Thomas is to call a priest to serve three quarter time. To manage a salary at the recommended level for clergy with five or more years of experience means that the focus for a rector would be to provide worship ministry, Christian education and pastoral care. All the other administrative management duties of the church would be conducted by lay leadership and the paid parish administrator.

Our parish treasurer, Anne VanDerveer, has prepared a three-year budget plan that would present a solid financial picture to candidates being considered for a three quarter time rector of St. Thomas. We have come to rely on our facility use income, but understand that income from that source is always variable. Currently \$100,000 of our budget comes from user fees, and we all need to be ambassadors for that source of funding. A facility brochure has been prepared by the Facilities Oversight committee for distribution. Copies are available on the narthex table, and if you know of potential non-profit users, please take a copy to share.

I invite you to communicate to me or any Vestry member your concerns, your interest in participating with our functioning ministries, and/or your involvement in the rector search process.

Together we will navigate our way forward with God's grace.

Grace Notes



As our St. Thomas faith community looks ahead to a period of time when we will be in search of a new rector, the need for supply clergy to serve our Sunday worship services demands immediate attention. Diane Landon graciously stepped up to the task of calling through the entire supply clergy list supplied by the Diocese. With her determined efforts Diane was able to fill supply priest assignments through the end of December, with JB finding willing supply clergy for two unassigned Sundays. This is a daunting task, especially in light of the fact that the availability of supply clergy is limited and there is great demand. As we worship together in the coming months, Diane's notes of grace will be faithfully celebrated and appreciated.

Creation Care

For those who control the wealth and resources of nations, that our provident God may give them loving and generous hearts; so that there may be bread for all the children of the earth, and protections and restoration of life endangered by climate change, we pray: Come, Holy Spirit.



As a community of faith we pray this prayer every Sunday in our Prayers of the People. We at St. Thomas are making a concerted effort to do our part with our various Creation Care projects – paper recycling practices; bottle collections for St. John the Divine's assistance programs; the annual electronics collection and delivery of recyclables to Next Step; replacement of all lighting to LEDs; and sunshades in the sanctuary for improved temperature management.

The Diocesan resolution for all churches to achieve a carbon neutral status by the year 2030 is a significant challenge that most churches, including St. Thomas, will be hard pressed to meet. However, we have made a good faith effort. As many are aware our gas stoves and ovens in the kitchen are twenty years old, unreliable and function poorly at best. Currently, the GrassRoots Garden is the only consistent user of these appliances, but other Parish

Hall and Kitchen users including St. Thomas, might be inclined to use these facilities if we had better functioning equipment.

The Facilities Oversight Committee, the Buildings and Grounds Committee and the Vestry have all reviewed and considered the proposal from the GrassRoots Garden to replace the current units with electric stove/oven units. This would require an electrical refit to accommodate the requested appliances. There is money in the maintenance fund specifically allocated for new stoves/ovens but not the refit. Having discussed funding for this project with all committees and individuals in the Parish, it was apparent that opinions were clearly divided in paying for the refit with St. Thomas maintenance funds. However, several individuals who take very seriously our prayerful commitment to creation care have given private funds to be allocated to the refit. and at this time 60% of the necessary funds to complete that portion of the project are available. The project to provide new electrical stove/oven units for the kitchen will not happen until all of the necessary funds for the refit have been made available. Meanwhile, the GrassRoots Garden will continue teaching their classes in food preparation from garden produce using the current appliances.

GrassRoots Garden

Garden: Since the beginning of GrassRoots, we've had a woodchip road down into and through the Garden. Over the decades, it's served us well and added an attractive rustic feel to the Garden thanks to the generous periodic donations of woodchips from area arborists and tree trimming companies. In the last few years, likely due to the higher gas prices and increased labor costs, it has become more and more difficult to get the woodchips needed to maintain the drive. Over the last few years, our drive had gradually begun to decompose and became a mud road in the winter causing our vehicles to get stuck and making it difficult to walk

planning and assistance from Rich Heil, our resident volunteer engineer, excavation and road construction by Manuel Serna and crew, our contractors, and technical assistance and efforts from Will DeMasse and Greg Dasso, our volunteer builders, in the middle of June we got our new road!

With this wider, more solid and stable access, FOOD for Lane County can now back their big refrigerator box trucks all the way down to the CoolBot on the east end of the north Orchard to pick up our weekly harvests. These regular pickups save garden staff time and effort bringing the harvest to FFLC at the end of long hot days in the back of our pickup truck. Every Tuesday, early in the day, shortly after harvest, our produce is picked up and delivered as fresh as possible for distribution and has higher quality due to the refrigerated transport.





In the process of putting in the road, we took the opportunity to also make some other significant infrastructure improvements. To work with a long-term problematic area during the winter months of standing water in a low spot around the stone water fountain, we added a French drain to pull the excess water down to the swale. Further, to create easier irrigation access, we installed water spigots at the ends of each greenhouse and simplified existing water lines. All these improvements were recorded on computer software for future reference and use. These infrastructure improvements take our garden operations to a higher more efficient level and open up other building opportunities and further advancements to come. We'll keep you posted.

Outreach


The Outreach committee has expressed their great appreciation for the wonderful contributions from our St.
