Endowment News

With the current market surge our Endowment Fund is growing! At this writing the fund is just in excess of \$300,000. However, we still must be prudent in our access to this reserve of financial resources. In keeping with the



state regulations regarding endowment funds, we cannot draw an amount greater than 7% of the fund balance each year. Earlier in the year \$10,000 was withdrawn and placed in a CD in order to secure some of our market gains.

The Endowment Board voted to fund the Young Musicians program for another year, and the Vestry enthusiastically approved of the expenditure of \$2400 of Endowment funds for this cherished program.

Grassroot Garden



Zucchini Whistles!! It's that time of year again! At GrassRoots, we teach many life skills. One example is how to make Zucchini Whistles, one of the important things in life! *Continued on page 4*

- 1. Begin by cutting off the zucchini leaf stem right at the base of the plant.
- **2.** Using the back of your knife, scrape the prickles off the stem. Be thorough! Or your whistle may poke your lips and you may regret it for a couple of days.
- 3. Next, holding the leaf up to the light, and looking at the stem where it connects to the leaf, you'll see one area is dark, because it is solid. Further down on the stem will be lighter, because it is hollow. Holding the stem, cut off the leaf above the solid part. Staying close to the leaf, making sure you're above the solid area, make the cut, being careful not to cut into the hollow part of the stem.
- 4. If you look at the end where you just cut, you'll see the shape of a heart. At the top of the heart, there is a large main vein. With control, and precision, cut a one-inch slit (beginning below the solid top) from the top of the main vein downward. Draw your knife back up, making sure to go all the way to the solid part without cutting through.
- **5.** Placing the bottom of the heart on your tongue, and making sure your lips completely cover up the slit you just cut, blow from your diaphragm.
- 6. Now, in order to make notes, use a sawing motion (back and forth), cut out half a circle (a semi-circle). Then reverse the stem, and cut out the other half of that circle, which creates the first note hole. The pad of your finger should be able to completely cover the hole. It's important to note the difference between a curved circle and an angular notch. You don't want to cut a notch, because you can't properly cover a notch with your finger. Notches also make corners, and weaken the integrity of your whistle, making it more likely to break.
- 7. Spacing holes one inch apart, you can add more notes. Five or less is ideal.

Zucchini whistle sound will improve over the first 15 minutes of playing. These whistles don't last forever, but will last longer if submerged in cold water. Zucchini whistles are a garden art. Many people don't even know how to grow zucchini, let alone knowing how to make and play zucchini whistles. If we don't practice and pass it on, this garden art may be lost and forgotten. Now that I've taught you, you must practice and pass it on. Happy whistling!

- \$500 to the Interfaith Food Hub
- \$500 to St. John's in support of their outreach projects
- \$500 to St. Matthews in support of their pantry project

The annual effort to provide Christmas gifts for the children of the St. Thomas Head Start program is underway with committee members engaged in shopping for sweatsuits according to requested sizes, age appropriate toys and packing supplies. An all-parish gift packing event will be coordinated for the Sunday prior to distribution.

Her goal is to get into Lane Community College in hopes of pursuing a career in firefighting. She is in the process of applying as a student for LCC's EMT course.

Senior Warden's Message

On Sunday, August. 10, as Senior Warden I had the opportunity to speak to the congregation. For the benefit of those who were not in attendance, the following is an excerpt from my remarks.

It is fitting that our newsletter bears the moniker of *The Beacon*. Just as the light beams from those shoreline columns provide guidance and reassurance for navigators, St. Thomas church prevails as a reassuring *beacon* of spiritual sustenance, hope and healing. And our Companions in Ministry enhance our efforts to serve the greater community. This year, as we search for a new rector, will be my sixth rector search and period of transition for St. Thomas, and I can assure you that we have always prevailed.

Yes, times are different today than they were during prior searches in 1982, and 1986, and 1999, and 2008, and 2015 and even more so today in 2025. Let me reassure you that your church leadership is actively engaged in communications with the four other Episcopal parishes in the Eugene/Springfield area to improve our relationships. The Rev. Chris Craun, Canon to the Ordinary, has been leading our conversations with lay leadership. These communications have been ongoing, thoughtful, and forward thinking.

After thoughtful consideration your Vestry has determined that our best course of action is to call a three-quarter time rector to serve St. Thomas. Our dedicated Parish treasurer, Anne VanDerveer has prepared a budget forecast for three years. Based on our income from pledges, plate offerings, user fees and operating expenses, St. Thomas can present to a candidate a sound budget for a three-quarter time rector to be compensated at the expected SHU (stipend, housing, utilities charge) level for salary and benefits. A three quarter time rector would have the option to serve another parish part time to fill that fourth quarter. Or, the rector might enjoy pursuing personal interests or another business endeavor to fill the remaining time. The expectation for a part time priest is to lead worship services, attend to pastoral care and Christian education for the parish.

A three-quarter time rector arrangement necessitates that the remaining duties of the management of the church and our very busy campus falls to the Parish Administrator and Lay leadership.

- Our wonderful Parish Administrator, JB Hoover, has specifically defined duties and responsibilities which are restricted to 18 hours per week.
- ➤ But there is so much more to do that will involve lay leadership. Additional assistance is needed on the important church committees: Finance and Budget, Personnel, and Facilities Oversight. It is gratifying that individuals have stepped up to be greeters to supply clergy, as well as managing the scheduling of LEMs and Lectors.
- As Senior Warden it is my responsibility to form a search committee. A committee of six would be ideal and at this time, four members have committed to this service.
